County Evaluation Summary

Evaluation Activities Completed, Findings, and Policy Impact

Each year, through community indicators, the FIRST 5 Mendocino (F5M) completes two evaluations to assess funded programs and service impacts on Mendocino County. These evaluations are used to determine if programs and services are contributing to a positive change in the community and are utilized to determine how F5M allocates funding. F5M has focused its funding on Early Learning and Care, Family Resilience, and Integrated & Equitable Systems. Through these processes F5M has continued to support county-wide family resource centers (FRCs), early learning programs, and parenting support groups. These programs continue to be successful throughout the county with rich collaboration through partner agencies.

County Highlights

County Highlight

This past fiscal year, FIRST 5 Mendocino (F5M) continued to build the professional skills of those who work with the County's youngest and most vulnerable. This was done through an annual State of the Child conference and a variety of Positive Parenting Program (Triple P) and Community Resiliency Model® (CRM) trainings, all targeted to decrease the negative effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences and to further build resiliency. January 2023 celebrated Mendocino County's annual Positive Parenting Awareness Month with a proclamation from the County Board of Supervisors. F5M saw an increase in local engagement of local initiatives like the Home Visting Consortium, Breastfeeding Coalition, and Birth-3 consortiums throughout the county. During this fiscal year, the activity to develop a Family Empowerment Center began and will guide our efforts into the next fiscal year to meet our Integrated & Equitable Systems strategic plan goal. The Home Visiting Consortium continues to identify programmatic needs to further increase enrollment and build family resilience. F5M acts as the community pathway to many programs that provide Home Visting, Breastfeeding support, Prenatal support, and childhood essential like diapers and wipes. F5M's adopted equity statement guides our communication with our partners to ensure that families, children, and communities are protected against racism, oppression, and inequality. By doing this, we have maintained strong relationships with our Indigenous and BIPOC populations. F5M is committed to ongoing quality improvements and conducting regular assessments to best meet the needs of our community.
